## Background

The City of Bellingham recognizes that a well-trained construction work force is critical to the success of public works projects. Apprenticeship training programs are particularly effective in providing training and experience to individuals seeking to enter or advance in the work force. By providing for apprenticeship utilization on public works projects, the City can create opportunities for training and experience that will help assure that a trained work force will be available in sufficient numbers in the future for the construction of public works projects.

On March 8, 2021, the City Council approved Ordinance 2021-03-007 adding chapter 4.94 to the Bellingham Municipal Code (BMC) requiring public works projects to provide apprentices with job training hours. Following the creation of BMC 4.94, the City worked to develop a standard specification for apprentice utilization to include when bidding projects. In 2023, the first projects went to bid that included this specification.

## **Program Requirements**

All public works projects estimated to cost \$1,000,000 or more with a time for completion more than 70 working days will require the contractor to have a minimum of 15% of total labor hours performed by apprentices enrolled in an approved apprenticeship program. BMC 4.94 requires, to the extent it is available, annual reporting on the apprenticeship program on its website that includes:

- The total number of labor hours actually worked by apprentices on City-owned public works projects;
- The number of apprentices broken down by trade and craft category;
- The number and percentage of minorities and women utilized as apprentices.

## 2023 and 2024 Results

Although the specifications related to the apprenticeship program were promulgated in 2023, no projects with the apprenticeship requirements reached physical completion by December 31, 2023. Information for projects that included apprenticeship requirements and were physically completed prior to December 31, 2024, is reported in the attached table.
