#### WHY NOW?



The Civic Athletic Complex Master Plan has not been updated since the 1980s. Though existing facilities are well-loved, the community's recreational and civic needs have continued to evolve with calls for expanded recreation opportunities, both indoors and outdoors.



We are also at a moment where the Bellingham School District's Carl Cozier Elementary is near the end of its useful life and are exploring the opportunities to build community consensus around Civic's future, including the existing Carl Cozier site, for the benefit of all the people of Bellingham.



Finally, while the park serves Citywide needs, we are also keenly aware that there are likely opportunities to improve how the park integrates and serves the surrounding neighborhoods and will use this process to better understand how playgrounds, a potential community recreation center, and improved access might help serve the surrounding community.





#### CLOSE TO EVERYTHING - NEIGHBORHOOD PROXIMITY














### CONTEXT CLOSE TO EVERYTHING - CITY PROXIMITY















#### PHASE 1 FINDINGS

#### WELL-LOVED, WELL-USED + VARIETY OF USER GROUPS.



Civic Athletic Complex is well-used and heavily programmed throughout the year (628 reservation requests annually). It is the most visited park in Bellingham's Park system with over 72,000 visitors per month. Almost twice Lake Padden and Boulevard Parks combined. The Recreation Needs Assessment (2022) notes that Civic is the premier destination for sports.





Despite its popularity, Civic is still not meeting the community's needs in terms of: Community recreation center, Expanded aquatics facilities, More covered recreation spaces, Athletic fields, Improved or expanded ice skating and hockey facilities.












### PHASE 1 FINDINGS NATURAL AREAS

- Racine Creek in forested area to the east.
- Northwest corner of Civic's two Whatcom Creek tributaries: Lincoln Creek and Moore Creek
- Several wetlands located on site, west of Puget Street and north of Civic Stadium
- Extensive forest with several protected landmark trees

City of Bellingham Mitigation Site Wetland Areas Wetland Buffer Zones Protected Landmark Trees











### PHASE 1 FINDINGS SUMMARY

- Every existing facility, including parking lots, are well used and occasionally maximize their capacity.
- The funding for some past improvements limits how much we can change their current uses.
- Various indoor and outdoor facilities are older and require some level of rehabiliatory maintenance for them to continue to function for the community.
- Athletics facilities are generally very well used with growing constituencies.
- Opportunity to define achieve long-standing community goals.
- Opportunity to generally improve the experience and positioning of Civic both in Bellingham and the region.











### SCHOOL PARAMETERS







Approximately 5 acres; average 8 acres

#### Build for 450 students:

- Building: approximately 70,000 SF
- Outdoor play & garden: ~50,000 SF
- Security: fenced perimeter & single entry/exit point
- Circulation: separation of bus and non-bus traffic; accessible parking per parking study
- Sustainable design elements, including energy reduction & stormwater management
- Swing school

#### Mutual benefit:

- Civic offers co-benefits for BPS families to access broader recreational amenities and services while offering cost efficiencies for taxpayers
- A new school on Civic's campus offers outdoor play, outdoor turf, indoor gym for the community to access outside of school hours











### OPTION 2 COMMUNITY CENTERED











### OPTION 3 THE CONNECTED CAMPUS

- Tuck-under and structured parking
- Preserves future expansion opportunity for the Sportsplex













### OPTION 4 THE LAKEWAY HUB
