Proposed New Chapter for the 2025 Plan



Why are we proposing this new chapter?

Community feedback: We heard how important the wellbeing of the community is throughout the engagement process. Part of this feedback included support for equitable and inclusive civic practices.

Significance: This topic is important and should be consolidated so relevant and new information is easier to find.

State Requirements: We must meet legislative requirements to plan for and accommodate housing that is affordable to all income levels. HB 1220 (2021) requires Bellingham to examine and address racially disparate impacts, displacement, and exclusion in housing policies and regulations.

Equity and Inclusion

Expand and strengthen equity and inclusion throughout the City's civic processes and practices.

Vitality and Belonging

Foster community vitality, reduce loneliness, and promote a positive sense of belonging through safety and connection.

Community Engagement Foster a welcoming environment for outreach and engagement by inviting and enabling community members to be involved in City government.

Arts and Culture

Promote and celebrate Bellingham's arts and culture.

Tribal Relations

Strengthen relationships and engagement processes with tribal nations and indigenous community members through informed practices that respect tribal sovereignty and honor treaty rights.
